

Year 5 - Autumn Term



In year five our learning is all about **Powerful Monarchs** and how different rulers have an affect on the lives of ordinary people.

In the Autumn Term our Inquiry is about the Impact of the Norman Invasion on the City of Norwich. We will also be learning the story of William of Norwich and how stories can have an impact on what we believe.

The questions we will be considering are:

- How are we shaped by others?
- Should we always believe what we hear?



In history we are learning:

- To study an aspect of local history significant to Norwich by using primary and secondary sources.
- About the legacies left from this period in history including Norwich Castle and Norwich Cathedral.
- About the cultural impact of the invasion and how the lives of people changed after 1066.

We will be learning about forces and Living things and their habitats.

We will learn:

Animals Including Humans:

• Describe the changes as humans develop to old age.

Living Things and Their Habitats

- Describe the differences in the life cycles of a mammal, an amphibian, an insect and a bird.
- Describe the life process of reproduction in some animals.

Forces:

- Explain that unsupported objects fall towards the Earth because of the force of gravity acting between the Earth and the falling object.
- Identify the effects of air resistance, water resistance and friction, that act between moving surfaces
- Recognise that some mechanisms, including gears, pulleys, levers allow a smaller force to have a greater effect.




We will learn about different countries within Europe, cities and regions. We will also learn about rivers and naming key features of a river.



Times Tables: In year 5 children should know all their times tables to 12 and the division facts. We use SUMDOG once a week in class to help recall times tables. You can access SumDog at home and practice your times tables knowledge. SUMDOG

This term we will be focussing on two authors in class.




Kes Gray
